



# Preflight Do's and Don'ts

## What To Wear

- Wear comfortable clothes
- Wear whatever shirt you want; the official shirt or something else
- Wear pieces of your WWII uniform if you want
- Wear a special hat if you want
- Wear comfortable shoes; do not wear new shoes, sandals, flip flops or other open toed shoes. Guardians will be required to remove their shoes, hats and jackets at TSA security in Orlando, vets (and anyone else over 75) will not

## What To Bring

- Bring an ID that matches your boarding pass exactly
- Bring sunscreen and sunglasses
- Bring a cell phone if you have one
- Bring medications for 2 days in a zip-lock bag
- If you wear contact lenses or glasses, bring along spares
- Your ID pouch will come with a small notepad, and a pencil

## Rules

- Most areas will be non-smoking; the only exception may be in the outdoor mall area
- Alcohol is not permitted on the entire trip. No stops at bars or lounges at the airports
- Check the weather in DC a day or two before the trip and bring rain gear if appropriate and if you wish. We will provide ponchos if it rains.
- You may take liquids, gels or aerosols in 3 oz bottles (or less) packed in a clear, quart-sized zip-lock bag
- Exceptions include prescription medications, gels for diabetics or other medical needs. MUST be in prescription bottles. MUST be declared to TSA officer.
- Inform security if you have a pacemaker or other medical implants or diabetic supplies
- Do not bring anything that needs to be checked and any large bags. Small backpacks are fine.
- Do not bring lighter, knife, fire arms, explosives, ... anything that will trigger security
- Do not bring a laptop or other electronic gear ... no time and no place for it

## Vets

- You do not need any money unless you want to purchase souvenirs
- Bring a camera if you want.

**Guardians**

- You may be pushing a wheel chair most of the day, dress accordingly
- Pushing a wheelchair with an umbrella in your hand is not easy.
- We will supply towels to wipe off the wheel chairs if it rains
- Bring a camera but remember that you may be pushing a wheel chair and bulky camera equipment may get in the way
